Community Health Needs Assessment Process

Florida Hospital New Smyrna (the Hospital) conducted a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) in 2016. The Assessment was regional and was conducted with the Volusia County Health Department and other community partners. The Assessment identified the health-related needs of the community including low-income, minority, and medically underserved populations.

In order to assure broad community input, Florida Hospital New Smyrna participated in a regional Community Health Needs Assessment Committee (CHNAC) to help guide the Hospital and its partners through the Assessment and Community Health Plan processes. The Committee included representation from Florida Hospital New Smyrna and four other Florida Hospital facilities in the region, public health, other area Hospitals and the broad community, as well as from low-income, minority and other underserved populations.

The Committee met throughout 2016 and early 2017. The members reviewed the primary and secondary data, reviewed the initial priorities identified in the Assessment, considered the priority-related Assets already in place in the community, used specific criteria to select the specific Priority Issues to be addressed by the Hospital, and helped develop this Community Health Plan (implementation strategy) to address the Priority Issues.

This Community Health Plan lists targeted interventions and measurable outcome statements for each Priority Issue noted below. It includes the resources the Hospital will commit to the Plan, and notes any planned collaborations between the Hospital and other community organizations and Hospitals.

Priority Issues that will be addressed by Florida Hospital New Smyrna

The following priorities were selected from ten health issues detailed in a 140-page needs assessment document. Utilizing a multi-voting technique, the Community Health Needs Assessment Committee narrowed the original 10 health issues to five priority health issues to be addressed by the Hospital. The prioritization lens included:

- **Impact:** How much does the issue affect other issues? What is the cost of NOT addressing it?
- **Trend & Magnitude of Difference:** Has the trend improved or worsened in the last five years? How much worse is the problem in New Smyrna compared to Florida?
- **Feasibility:** Are there successful strategies to address this problem? Is there a positive cost-benefit to addressing the problem?

Florida Hospital New Smyrna will address the following Priority Issues in 2017-2019:

1. Adult Behavioral Health

Adult Mental Health and Substance Abuse are closely tied to the other initial priorities and other socioeconomic issues such as domestic violence, child abuse and housing stability/homelessness.

2. Youth Mental Health and Behavioral Health

It is estimated that 50 percent of mental health conditions manifest themselves during adolescence. Preventing mental and/or substance use disorders and related problems in children, adolescents, and young adults is critical to Americans' behavioral and physical health.

3. Chronic Disease: Cardiovascular and Diabetes

The modifiable risk factors for both Cardiovascular Disease and Diabetes are similar and closely related to healthy eating and physical activity. Disparities must be addressed for sub-groups disproportionately impacted (age, gender, income, race/ethnicity, health insurance status, employment status, housing status, residence in the county).

4. Barriers to Accessing Health Care Services

Despite the existence of many health care resources, there remains access barriers for some sub-groups of the population (individuals living in poverty, homeless, certain racial/ethnic groups, individuals without health insurance, individuals living in certain areas of the county).

5. Health Eating and Physical Activity

The health behaviors of Healthy Eating and Physical Activity are directly related to health and wellness in general.

Issues that will not be addressed by Florida Hospital New Smyrna

Florida Hospital New Smyrna will not directly address the following issues:

A. Chronic Disease – Respiratory

The Community Health Needs Assessment Committee believed that the above issues were more important for the community to address.

B. Communicable and Infectious Disease

The local Health Departments are working on this issue.

C. Availability of Health Resources

This issue includes the availability, cost and lack of insurance coverage. The Hospital has financial counselors who help patients qualify for Medicaid and make referrals to area Marketplace Navigators who help people enroll in affordable coverage. Florida did not expand Medicaid coverage under the Affordable Care Act, leaving many people unable to afford insurance or qualify for premium subsidies.

D. Injuries

Accident and injury prevention are not competencies of Florida Hospital New Smyrna.

E. Socio-Demographics

Socio-economic issues are not a competency of the Hospital.

Board Approval

The Florida Hospital New Smyrna Hospital Board formally approved the specific Priority Issues and the full Community Health Needs Assessment in 2016. The Board also approved this Community Health Plan.

Ongoing Evaluation

Florida Hospital New Smyrna's fiscal year is January-December. For 2017, the Community Health Plan will be deployed beginning April 1 and evaluated at the end of the calendar year. In 2018 and beyond, the Plan will be implemented and evaluated annually for the 12-month period beginning January 1 and ending December 31. Evaluation results will be attached to our IRS Form 990, Schedule H.
